David G. McLone, MD, PhD

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Dr. McLone, a pioneer in pediatric neurosurgery, has devoted his career to the care of children with spina bifida. He has addressed this problem at every level – from scientific study of the relevant anatomy and physiology, development of new surgical techniques and tools, and careful collection of clinical outcomes data over several decades, to the founding and financial support of a residential transitional housing complex for adults with spina bifida. In the course of his career, he has transformed the way this and other congenital neurologic conditions are viewed and addressed throughout the world.

Dr. McLone received his MD degree from the University of Michigan Medical School in 1965, and pursued doctoral study in neuroanatomy at Northwestern concurrent with his neurosurgical residency training. During residency, he gravitated toward a focus in pediatric neurosurgery, having been involved in exploration of the pathogenesis of hydrocephalus during his graduate work, and established the spina bifida clinic at Children’s Memorial Hospital during his residency. He then joined the faculty at Northwestern, where he has remained throughout his career, serving as chairman of the Division of Pediatric Neurosurgery from 1978-2001, and chief of Surgery from 2001-2003.

Dr. McLone was a founding member of the American Society of Pediatric Neurosurgeons, served as its president from 1990-1992, and led the development of the American Board of Pediatric Neurosurgeons, serving as its first chairman from 1991-1996. Dr. McLone has published over 170 journal articles and 100 books and book chapters during his career, and served as the editor in chief of *Pediatric Neurosurgery*.

Early in Dr. McLone’s career, the survival rate for children born with spina bifida was about 10%. Building on his laboratory work, he developed new surgical techniques. As he perfected these techniques, he kept meticulous and comprehensive records of children’s medical, developmental, and social progress. These clinical outcomes studies demonstrated the effectiveness of surgical intervention on behalf of these children. His approach to the care of these children is now the standard of care, and survival into adulthood among his cohort treated at Children’s Memorial is now over 75%.

As Dr. McLone himself writes, “One of the greatest challenges in medicine today is establishing a network of care for adults with spina bifida.” Dr. McLone has met these challenges in an extraordinary way, in founding The Village Foundation in 2001, in conjunction with the Anixter Center. The Village Foundation, “committed to enhancing the quality of life for young adults with chronic neurological disabilities by providing opportunities and habilitation services that foster independence,” has built a 15-unit apartment complex in Chicago, the first of its kind created specifically for people with spina bifida and related disabilities. Dr. McLone served as President and CEO of the Village Foundation during the formative phase of the apartment complex and continues to provide services there as medical director. He is also President and CEO of the Board for YMCA’s Camp Independence. While Dr. McLone has received a number of national awards, including the Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Spina Bifida Association in 2009, it is with deep respect and gratitude that IOMC recognizes his humanitarian service within the metropolitan Chicago community.

We are honored to name **Dr. David McLone** the 2010 recipient of the **Russe Citation for Exemplary Compassion in Health Care**.

Recognition Award in Patient Safety**

David Mayer, MD

Dr. Mayer is Associate Dean for Curriculum, Vice-Chair for Quality and Safety and Director of Cardiothoracic Anesthesiology, Co-Executive Director of the Institute for Patient Safety Excellence (IPSE) at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) College of Medicine and Curriculum Director for the Masters in Patient Safety Leadership (MPSL) program. In 2005, Dr. Mayer founded the Telluride, Colorado Invitational Roundtable on Designing Patient Safety and Quality Outcomes Health Science Curricula. This annual multidisciplinary roundtable brings together patient safety leaders from the AMA, ANA, Joint Commission, NBME, ACGME, ABIM, Lucian Leape Institute, ISMP, informatics, simulation and health science education together with patients, residents, and students. He is a member of the National Quality Forum (NQF) Patient Safety advisory board, an invited consultant to the New South Wales' National Commission Task Force addressing safety, quality and educational issues in Acute Healthcare and an invited member of the Lucian Leape Institute patient safety educational roundtable.

Dr. Mayer has been an invited keynote speaker at numerous international patient safety education meetings and has authored a number of patient safety articles including ACGME Bulletin articles on "The Role of Simulation-based Team Training to Support a Safety Culture" and "Resident Learning Opportunities within the context of a Comprehensive Program for Responding to Adverse Patient Events". Dr. Mayer was awarded the 2007 University of Illinois American Association of Medical Colleges (AAMC)/Pfizer Humanism in Medicine Award for his commitment to teaching, service, patient advocacy and patient care. Dr. Mayer is clearly a most deserving recipient of the Otho S. A. Sprague Award in Patient Safety.

Timothy B. McDonald, MD, JD

Timothy McDonald, MD, JD, is a Professor of Anesthesiology and Pediatrics at the University of Illinois College of Medicine. He serves as the Director of Pediatric Anesthesiology at the University of Illinois Medical Center at Chicago (UIMCC). During his pediatric and anesthesiology residencies he maintained his academic appointment at Harvard Medical School. He has practiced pediatric anesthesia in Chicago for the past eighteen years. While providing anesthesia at UIMCC, Dr. McDonald attended Loyola Law School as a full-time night student and received his JD degree, passed the Illinois Bar Exam and became a licensed attorney in 1997.

Following his graduation from Loyola, Dr. McDonald began to work closely with the Department of Safety and Risk Management at UIMCC. In 1999, he became chair of the UIMCC Medical Staff Review Board, providing oversight for the investigation and management of all unexpected adverse patient events. In 2003, he became the Associate Chief Medical Officer for Safety, Risk Management and Quality with expanded responsibility and input into the management of the University's medical malpractice activities. In 2005, along with Ms. Nikki Centomani, Dr. McDonald helped create the medical center's comprehensive program for responding to adverse patient events that includes a "full disclosure with rapid apology and rapid remedy" process. Dr. McDonald has recently been promoted to Chief Safety and Risk Officer for Health Affairs for the University of Illinois. It is IOMC's honor to recognize Dr. McDonald's many accomplishments in the patient safety arena.

Portes/IOMC Excellence in Prevention of Disease Award

The Family of Mr. Richard Kalish

Mr. Dick Kalish is being honored tonight for his work with The Portes Foundation.

The Foundation grew out of an organization called The Portes Cancer Prevention Center, a health screening facility offering patients medical health evaluations. It is perhaps ironic that Dick himself succumbed to thyroid cancer last year, much too soon.

With the advent of managed care, the Center realized it could no longer function as a diagnostic facility. As Board President, Dick recommended the original facility be closed and its assets preserved.

Under his leadership, the screening facility completed a transition to the philanthropic Foundation that continues to carry out the Portes Mission – the awarding of grants for worthwhile projects that might not otherwise be funded through conventional sources. He developed a methodology by which to accomplish this, devising a plan for a lay board to appraise funding grants. In addition, he helped Portes affiliate with the Institute of Medicine of Chicago, an arrangement that continues productively to this day.

Each year, with a share of thanks to Dick's efforts, The Portes Foundation funds 2 to 3 grant proposals a year, that target the promotion of health or prevention of disease.

Dick's legacy is that of a man whose involvement in leadership and service produced valuable results. This was a role he thrived in, and excelled at. He loved nothing more than being with and interacting with others, assisting people and fostering their ideas. In this spirit, may The Portes Foundation continue to carry on his work.

IOMC Humanitarian Global Health Award

This award is given to a Chicago metropolitan area individual or organization that has provided voluntary, longstanding, and international humanitarian health service(s). This year the IOMC was faced with a daunting task, occasioned by the even more daunting crisis created by the earthquake in Haiti.
